The iron mill stream is located in an area of special natural significance and importance to the parish. The north bank is within Oakford Parish, while the south bank is within Stoodleigh Parish. Description:

Cobbled walkways at the side of the road are a noted historic feature of Bullen Street, the Bury, Jericho Street and parts of Silver Street, School Lane and Milfords Lane. In some areas, such as in front of doorways, the cobbles have been deliberately laid in patterns, sometimes including the use of white stones.

Cobbled paving along the side of Silver Street, with open water rills down the opposite side provides character and aesthetic value to Thorverton. There is also a ford through the water rills, next to the listed cobbled footbridge, from Silver Street onto Milsfords Lane.
